Duccio di Buoninsegna was an Italian painter active in Siena, Tuscany, in the late 13th and early 14th centuries. He was hired throughout his life to complete many important works in government and religious buildings around Italy.

Duccio's early work was similar in style to Cimbabue works, but he was more successful than Cimbabue and influenced for the next 200 years of Sienese painting.

He created one of the largest paintings ever made in Italy, "The Maesta". Duccio's known works are on wood panel, painted in egg tempera and embellished with gold leaf.
